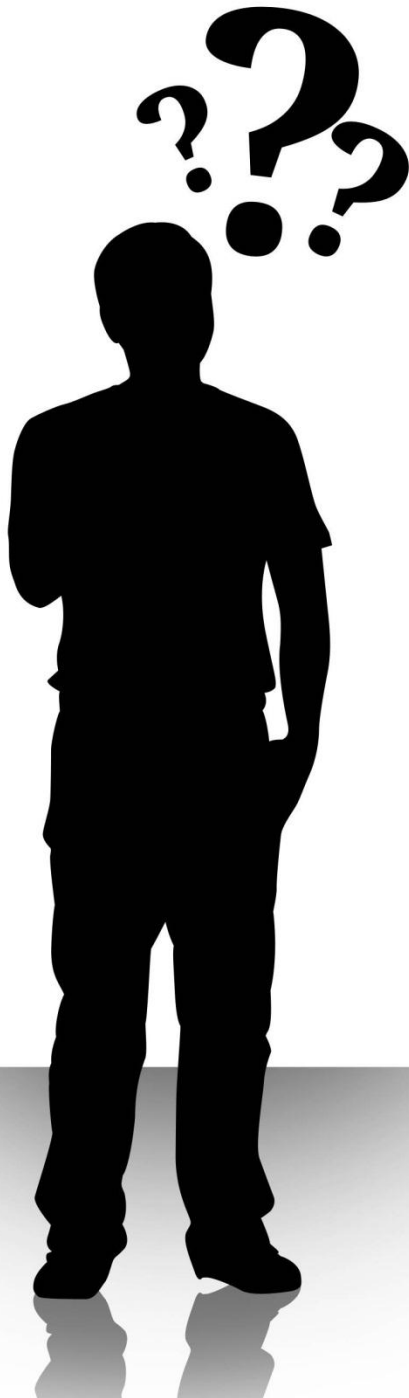

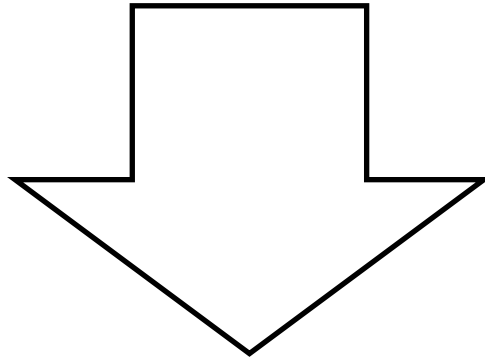
Communiqué
Meeting of the High-Level Panel of Eminent Persons
on the Post-2015 Development Agenda
in Bali, Indonesia, 27 March 2013

We, members of the High-Level Panel commissioned by the United Nations Secretary-General to recommend an ambitious yet achievable framework for the world's post-2015 development agenda, met in Bali, Indonesia from 25 to 27 March 2013. We discussed how to build a global partnership and means of implementation for our development agenda.

We highly value the importance of an open, transparent and inclusive process. We seek to promote global ownership of a shared development agenda. We have therefore consulted with a range of stakeholders prior to and during our meeting in Bali on a range of development issues. We heard reports from women, youth and the informal sector, from parliamentarians and other elected representatives, the initial findings of national, regional and thematic consultations conducted by civil society, academia, the UN, national governments, the private sector, and other stakeholders. We welcome the richness and depth they have brought to the process and are committed to continuing broad consultations and to finding ways of reflecting the priorities that we have heard.

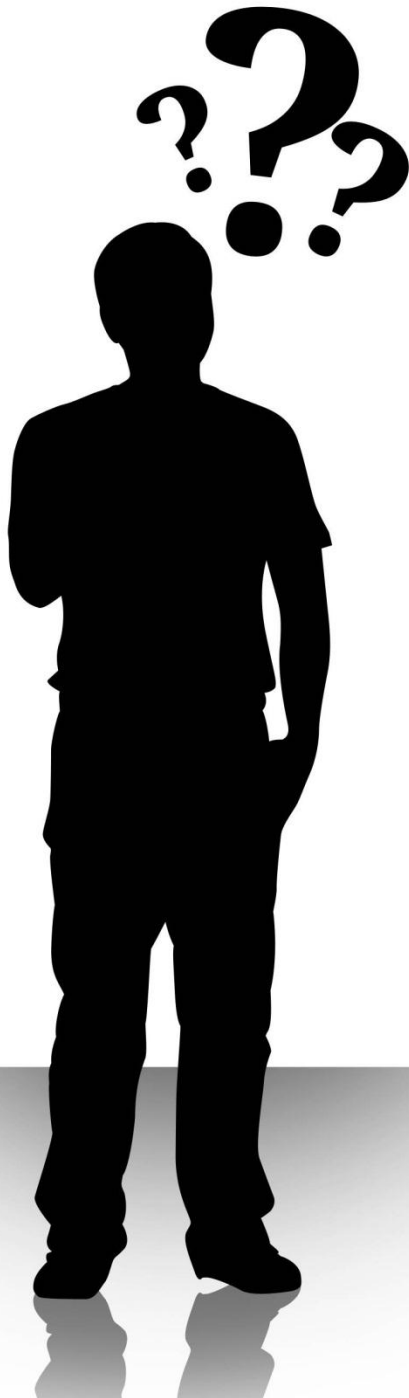

MDG-like goals

- Universal availability of both Basic Emergency Obstetrical Care and Comprehensive Essential Obstetrical Care
- Universal access to HIV, TB and malaria treatment
- Universal access to sexual and reproductive health and protection of sexual and reproductive rights

MDG-like goals

- Good health for the best possible physical, mental, and social well-being
- Improving health for the most vulnerable: women, children, and persons with disabilities
- Early childhood development
- Gender goal
- Child protection and care

MDG-like goals

- End preventable child and maternal deaths and morbidity
- Reduce child stunting
- Reduce dying from the four main NCDs
- One Health approach goal
- Targets for financing for health
- Accelerate global health research

The High Level Dialogue on Health in the Post-2015 Development Agenda

Identified priorities (1)

- The present health MDGs (4, 5 and 6) must remain central to the post-2015 agenda
 - accelerating progress where targets have not been achieved
 - setting more ambitious targets for the period to come.
 - greater emphasis on equity between and within countries
- Sexual and reproductive health and rights must be addressed.
 - comprehensive sexuality education
 - protection from sexual violence and abuse.

Identified priorities (2)

- Additional health priorities based on rapid changes in the burden of disease in all countries must be addressed
 - noncommunicable diseases and their risk factors
 - mental health.

Guiding principles (1)

- Principles of human rights, equity, gender equality, accountability and sustainability.
- People-centered and rights-based.
- Limited in number, convincing, clear and specific, easy to communicate to politicians and the public, measurable, time-bound, and achievable.
- The goals and indicators should have universal relevance; ensure attention to the most vulnerable, marginalized, stigmatized, and hard to reach populations

Guiding principles (2)

- Capture contribution of the health sector to development and contribution of other sectors to health
- Take account of the different stages of life
- Considerable attention to the process, with strong emphasis on country ownership.

Emerging framework for health

- Overall Goal: Maximizing health at all stages of life
- Specific goals
 - Accelerating progress on the health MDG (4,5 and 6) agenda.
 - Reducing the burden of major NCDs with a focus on the most important NCDs
- Universal Health Coverage (UHC) as the health sector's key contribution to achieving the goals
